# MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT & EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

We are proud of the hard work that our dedicated staff, management, volunteers and board of directors have accomplished over the past year. We serve a diverse community of urban, suburban and rural neighbourhoods, each with their own strengths, challenges and successes. Some of our activities in 2018/2019 include:

In alignment with our strategic plan, we are working to identify the service gaps and address the needs of our youth, seniors and rural populations throughout our catchment. In partnership with the Salvation Army and the Barrhaven BIA we recently held our fourth Annual Top Shelf Ball Hockey Tournament. All funds raised from this successful tournament in Barrhaven are dedicated to Youth programs and services which address mental wellness in the Barrhaven community.

Our 'Shine a Light on our Community' Gala was held in April. This year's event was again very successful, with a net profit of \$33,000. The evening was hosted by

Boom 99.7's Dylan Black and highlighted Dr. Phil Ritchie as our guest speaker, and Johnny Vegas as headline entertainment. Dr. Ritchie spoke to the importance of mental health supports and services and about giving back to our communities, while Johnny Vegas had the guests up and dancing to the classics! The event featured the winners from our inaugural 'NROCRC's Got Talent' contest held in March. Stay tuned for this coming year's event to be held in May 2020, which will feature the finalists of 'NROCRC's Got Talent' competing for the title.

We continue to receive a large number of donations and support from community members and businesses. Donations, sponsorships, and funding from our community are an integral part of our operational budget and we'd like to thank each and every individual, group, and business that supports us and understands that by helping NROCRC we all benefit!

The Finance Committee continued to be active this year and has helped to maintain NROCRC's high standards of financial transparency and accountability. Thanks to the members of the Finance Committee for their guidance and support over the past year.

We are also pleased to report that the Board has just recently approved the renovation of NROCRC's reception area which will improve the accessibility of our services and decrease risks to our staff and clients.

This fall we are also looking forward to conducting a review of NROCRC's strategic plan, which will include reviewing the accomplishments to date and the goals for the remaining 18 months of the plan.

NROCRC continues to do our work with a community development lens, focussing on neighbourhoods, while bringing together residents, community organizations, funders, and leaders to build strong communities.

There are so many wonderful initiatives going on at NROCRC. A few highlights of our past year and our current year include, but are certainly not limited to:

#### **Tornado Relief**

On September 21, 2018 tornadoes directly impacted the communities of Trend Arlington and Craig Henry. We saw the immediate coming together of the communities, residents, funders, Councillor Keith Egli, the City of Ottawa, faith groups, and so many more, with the goal of helping those who were most affected. There are more details about NROCRC's work later in this report.



#### **Social Infrastructure Campaign**

NROCRC's board and staff understand the value of a city that supports and invests in social infrastructure. This means investing in the organizations, people, services, and networks that support the health and well-being of our communities. Investing in Ottawa's social infrastructure means valuing important services such as housing and public transit, community services and recreation, access to good food and childcare, education and employment, long term care and healthcare, and much more. We are currently advocating for the City of Ottawa to make not for profit social service organization funding a priority of this Council's term, to develop a strategy and to increase funding for the not for profit sector.

# Changing Funding Environment

# The Walk-In Counselling Clinic

NROCRC is pleased to announce that we now have weekly Walk-In Counselling services provided by the Walk-In Counselling Clinic and Jewish Family Services. This partnership is a great fit to support mental wellness in our community by providing single session counselling. Counselling is offered in French, English, and Arabic. NROCRC continues to offer important short term counselling for youth, couples, and adults.

#### Safety Audit

We recently completed a safety audit with the Women's Initiative for Safer Environment (WISE). The audit identified that our reception area needed to be updated and changed to provide a safer area for our staff and our clients. We will be completing these renovations in the fall of 2019.

Maureen Kennedy - Director



# A Q&A WITH MARTIN EVISON

(His thoughts after serving nine terms on NROCRC's Board of Directors)

# Q: How did you get involved with NROCRC?

A: A friend of mine asked me to assist him with a project he was conducting for the Leadership Table to End Homelessness. I met the members of the Leadership Table, one of whom was Lorraine Bentley. At that time, Lorraine was also the President of NROCRC. She asked me if I would be interested in becoming a board member. I was interviewed by Lorraine and Sandy Wooley and although I had no board experience, no experience with not for profit, and had not heard of NROCRC until I met Lorraine, they recommended me to the board and I was voted on.

# Q: You have just completed the maximum term of nine years; why did you stay involved?

A: Many reasons. Initially, I think I was fascinated by all the work that NROCRC achieves. It was a complete eyeopener to me that the city that I think of as being quite affluent has so many people in need, then the longer I worked with Sandy and the more I got to know her, the more I wanted to make sure the board supported her goals for NROCRC.

In addition, I have met most if not all of the NROCRC employees and I have a profound respect for what they do and what they achieve.

# Q: What roles did you have on the board and committees?

A: I was Chair of the HR committee. I can't remember when I took on the role. I think it was a situation where the previous Chair resigned from the board and no one on the board had HR experience. I had never worked in HR, but had worked closely with HR reps. The committee then went on to revise all the HR policies to keep them in line with modern trends. For the last three or four years I have been the Secretary. During my last nine years there have been three strategic planning sessions. I facilitated the first two meetings. These meetings involved both board members and staff members and resulted in strategic plans that met the board's strategic goals and were fully supported by the NROCRC staff. I am also a member of the Shine a Light fundraising committee.

Q: Why have you decided to stay on the Shine a Light Committee? Why is the Gala important to you and NROCRC's mission?

A: I believe that the Gala is important to NROCRC. Obviously we raise funds, but it is so much more than that. It's a major vehicle for advertising what NROCRC does and how many people we positively impact. I also believe that seeing a large room full of people supporting NROCRC has a strong motivational impact on board and staff members. I've stayed on the committee as I have been on it since it was first formed, and it allows me to keep in touch with NROCRC.

#### Q: Why do you volunteer?

A: I have been very fortunate in life. I have never had to worry where my next meal will come from; never struggled to pay rent; never been bullied, depressed, abused, addicted. I think as a society it is very important that those of us who are fortunate give a helping hand to those who need it.

Q: Do you have a message for community members or partners about getting involved with NROCRC, or charity giving / volunteering on a broader scale?

## **NROCRC'S CHAMPIONS**

This year NROCRC is proud to honour Clarke and Ellie Topp for their commitment and service to our community!

Ellie and Clarke have lived in Bells Corners for over fifty years. Clarke led a successful career as an agricultural research scientist at the Central Experimental Farm, and Ellie has published ten cookbooks, worked as a cooking school director at Betty's Kitchen in Ottawa, and in various capacities has served as a food consultant for government entities.

Not only was Ellie a member of the NROCRC Board of Directors for a full term of nine years, but both Clarke and Ellie are heavily involved in volunteerism and have donated their time and funding to numerous organizations and causes over the years. They found that living in Nepean allowed them to see and experience the benefits and needs of the community. They were involved in the Bells Corner United Church and in outreach projects in the community and

beyond, including being founding members of the Ottawa West End Community Chaplaincy in the PQCHC catchment area in 1984.

Being aware of the continual decline of social services over the past 35 years, especially for the under-privileged, Clarke and Ellie became involved promoting a basic income guarantee with their involvement with the Basic Income Canada Network. They were among the initiators and organizers of Group Ottawa for Basic Income Guarantee (GO4BIG). This group operated for five years in Ottawa, and during this time Clarke provided information/promotion on basic income to the NROCRC staff.

For his many volunteer activities, Clarke was proud to receive the Canada 150 Award in 2018.

Through the Ottawa Community
Foundation, the Topps are continuing to
build the "Ellie and Clarke Topp Fund",
the earnings from which are currently
funding two "Milk and Eggs" programs for
prenatal education, one at South-East

## **TORNADO RELIEF PROJECT**

September 21st, 2018 saw the worst weather systems to hit Nepean in more than 90 years. The Tornado caused damage to hundreds of homes and wide-spread power outages lasted for days in certain areas.

The Trend Arlington and Craig Henry communities were among the most severely affected. In the weeks and months that followed, we partnered with and received support from the City of Ottawa, United Way, Ottawa Community Foundation, and the Ottawa Senators Foundation to provide:

- Food Relief
- Service & Resource Referrals
- Individual & Group Counselling
- Mindfulness Classes
- Stress & Anxiety Workshops
- Community Events

Wellness checks to over 650 homes in Craig Henry and Trend Arlington

Over 100 food gift cards provided to 40 households

256 adults and children attended a variety of counselling worksops

# **PROGRAMS: COUNSELLING**

NROCRC's Master-level counsellors provide confidential, free, short-term counselling services to youth (12 to 17) and adults (18+). Services are provided at the Emerald Plaza in Nepean, and also at the South Nepean Community Health Centre (SNCHC) in Barrhaven. Counselling is available to individuals. couples and families living in the Nepean, Rideau and Osgoode catchment area. Our counselling work is based primarily on an in-depth, holistic, collaborative approach that identifies the needs, strengths and goals of the client in order to encourage healthy change; it is client-centered and generally non-directive in nature.



#### Counselling Services include:

- Assessment, crisis intervention and short-term counselling
- Information, personal support and referral services (including bridging vulnerable clients to long-term or specialized services)
- Psychoeducation/Health
   Promotion groups and school workshops

#### We support people to cope with:

- Depression / low mood
- Anxiety / worry
- Stress
- Relationship difficulties
- Trauma / Abuse
- Sexuality
- Assertiveness
- Life transitions
- Body image
- Self-esteem

250 youth and adults were assisted by our counselling services

#### NEW - Intake:

In the fall of 2018 we received funding from the City of Ottawa to hire an intake worker at NROCRC. This exciting new position has allowed the counsellors more availability to provide individual and group counselling. The intake worker's role is to assess each client's needs and to provide appropriate referrals (internal and/or external). We are thrilled to have a new NROCRC member on our counselling team!

## **PROGRAMS: EARRS**

The Elder Abuse Response & Referral Service (EARRS), a bilingual city wide program, has been operating at NROCRC for over ten years. EARRS provides Intake, Case Management and Education & Awareness sessions, and operates a Respite Bed Program through a partnership with Visavie. Elder abuse can happen to anyone, regardless of gender, age, income or culture. Our program regularly receives calls from family members, friends & neighbors, seniors, and various service providers throughout the City of Ottawa.

We would like to acknowledge and thank our funders: Employment and Social Development Canada's (ESDC) New Horizons for Seniors and the Champlain Local Health Integration Network (through our partnership with Carefor). Without the important funding we receive, many seniors would not get the support they need to improve or resolve the abusive situations they find themselves living in.

## **PROGRAMS: SENIORS**

#### **Seniors Program**

Our new programming for seniors includes a variety of free activities across our community, More than 100 seniors are registered for programs that run every Tuesday and Wednesday at four different locations, allowing seniors to connect with others and remain active outside their homes.

#### Weekly activities include:

- Swimming
- Low impact exercise
- "Tell Us Your Story" sharing sessions
- Singing, painting, arts and crafts, & board games, and more
- Presentations on health-related topics such as "Fall Prevention"
- Presentations on technology
- Cooking and baking
- Quarterly trips to museums and parks

#### Young at Heart 55+ Social Club

This social club continues to encourage seniors to engage in their community, while reducing social isolation through volunteering, actively participating in and leading community activities. The program provides activities, information, and resources to help seniors improve their quality of life, and health and well-being. The program offers a safe and positive space for seniors to learn about different topics that are important to them. The group has many guest speakers and mentors such as Mary Cook. Mary Cook is an Ottawa Valley icon, who visited the group this year and shared her stories of her years growing up in Renfrew County. The program also provides opportunities for seniors to share their knowledge and expertise with other seniors in the community.



# **PROGRAMS: YOUTH**

#### **Sports and Recreation**

Our program provides weekly activities including yoga, Zumba and swimming for women, as well as soccer, basketball, mixed sports and youth drop-in's for children. Taking place in multiple neighborhoods, this program increases opportunities for low income individuals to access sports, social and recreational activities. ~ NROCRC gratefully acknowledges the funding we receive from the Province of Ontario Communities in Action and the use of free space provided by Minto Apartments.

#### After School Programs

Our Afterschool program served over 65 registered participants in two locations. Average attendance at our Manordale and Parkwood Hills location was 20 participants per day. **After School Program** 



Manordale Camp

Summer Camps 120 youth participated in eight summer camps in Barrhaven, Manordale, Tanglewood and Parkwood Hills this year. Youth took part in the City of Ottawa's "I Love to Play Soccer" program, made crafts, conducted experiments, participated in water-related activities, and much more. Our camps offer vital support to low-income families who would not otherwise have the opportunity to participate in fun, healthy, and educational summer time programs.

# **PROGRAMS: YOUTH**

#### EarlyON Program - Parkwood Hills

This program provides children and families with a high-quality early learning experience that meet the individual needs of families while recognizing the diversity of our community. The program continues to offer free drop-ins for children, their parents, and caregivers. It also offers a safe environment that fosters positive learning, advice, and personal connections that build links with the local community. The program's individual and group activities are designed to foster development in language/literacy, and social/emotional competence, as well as cognitive and motor skills.

#### Parkwood Hills Youth Leadership Program

Offering volunteer and leadership opportunities to youth aged 12-17, this program focuses on helping our youth build valuable skills for future employment, and gives them a 'voice" in the community as they take the lead in various community initiatives. Our youth supported many events and initiatives in Parkwood Hills such as the "Green Screen Movie Night", and others programs by volunteering at the After School Program and the Young at Heart 55+ Social Club for seniors. The Leadership Program helps youth by giving them the tools and support they need to become engaged and empathetic citizens with a sense of ownership and responsibility.

# **PROGRAMS: COMMUNITY**

#### Milk and Eggs program

Milk and Eggs provides a safe and inclusive space in the community for pregnant women, and new mothers to meet, socialize and learn about nutrition and the health and support services available for them in Ottawa. The program provides low-income pregnant women and new mothers with access to healthy and nutritious meals and snacks twice a month. Milk and Eggs is successfully running in two sites (Parkwood Hills and at the Haven community in Barrhaven). We have provided participants with various training opportunities such as a 'First Aid for Parents' course and 'Making the Connection' training which aims to to teach parents about secure parent-infant attachment. We are pleased with the collaborations and partnerships that have developed as a result of the Milk and Eggs program at the Parkwood Hills and the Haven locations.



#### **Good Food Box Ottawa**

Good Food Box is a program that focuses on delivering monthly affordable boxes of delicious and nutritious fruits and vegetables to 40 neighbourhood locations. The Good Food Box improves access to locally grown, culturally diverse produce by providing a low-cost way to get fresh fruits and vegetables to our neighbourhoods. The program recognizes the importance of having fresh local produce accessible to all and helps residents to eat healthy food, save money and learn new healthy recipes.

# **PROGRAMS: COMMUNITY**

#### The Manordale Women's Crafting Group (MWCG) - & Social Enterprise Project

This program/project is designed to spark the entrepreneurial spirit by providing the skills, knowledge and resources to enhance and develop the participants' entrepreneur skills. The project benefits the Manordale-Woodvale neighbourhood, as it builds the capacity of the community by harnessing the existing skills and abilities of newcomer women living in the neighbourhood. Participants had the opportunity to support the Manordale-Woodvale Community Association's (MWCA) Community Christmas Event. Group members and volunteers also organized the Holiday Bake and Sale Event in the community. The project provided support for group members to help them gain the skills necessary to become independent and self -sustaining. These supports cover a wide range of topics and can help immigrants with accessing financial literacy and learning about the Canadian business culture. The project also provided additional engagement opportunities for newcomer women who are interested in volunteering, learning and gaining a better understanding of the Canadian culture.

## **PROGRAMS: COMMUNITY**

#### Community Development Framework (CDF) Project

This project is located in the Tanglewood Hillsdale Community. NROCRC worked collaboratively with the Tanglewood Hillsdale Community Association throughout the period of this project to increase the sense of belonging and enhance the engagement level among residents in Tanglewood. The project focused on capacity-building while supporting community leaders and volunteers to identify community assets. Through the project's different engagement activities and events, community leaders and volunteers were able to connect with residents and identify practical local issues that are affecting the community. The CDF project also created a range of opportunities for residents to contribute and support Tanglewood's various neighbourhood based programs such as the Neighborhood Watch and the Community Garden.

#### Income Tax Program, Legal and Dental Clinics

Our Income Tax Program is one of the largest "No Fee" programs in the city. This year two staff members and sixteen volunteers served a total of 900+ people. Our free bi-monthly legal clinics, provided by Nelligan, O'Brien, Payne LLP and Peter Stieda, B.Sc., LL.L., LL.B, (free of charge) served 84 individuals, by offering a variety of services including: affidavits, notarization, family law, immigration, mental health, and disability. And, our monthly dental clinics, in partnership with the Ottawa Health Department, provided free of charge dental screening to 91 individuals.

## SOCIAL INFRASTRUCTURE CAMPAIGN

NROCRC is proud to join other members of the Ottawa Coalition of Community Health and Resource Centres in a city wide social infrastructure campaign. The campaign is asking the City of Ottawa to invest in and plan for the social infrastructure needed to improve community health and well-being.

Social infrastructure involves a range of activities, organizations, and facilities that foster and maintain social cohesion and community resilience. It is a net of supports that Ottawa residents are often not aware of until it is no longer in place or until they need to access such services. Social infrastructure includes parks, libraries, recreation centres, social programming, and accessible transit among many other elements.

Our campaign will include a petition for residents, volunteers and community professionals to sign, social media blasts, meeting with residents, city councillors and our Community and Protective Services Committee.

#### Join our campaign to:

- Make not for profit social service funding a priority of this Council's term.
- Call for the City of Ottawa to develop a social infrastructure strategy
- Increase funding for the nonprofit social services sector in Ottawa by \$5M

# 2019 HIGHLIGHTS - FANTASTIC COMMUNITY EVENTS









# **EVENTS: BALL HOCKEY 4 ON 4**






# **PROGRAMS BREAKDOWN**
